Fines and fine debt are relatively high in locations of social and economic disadvantage in the region, including Maitland, East Maitland, Raymond Terrace and Cessnock. 42% of fines were issued in the Hunter region for travelling on public transport without a ticket.

We would like to reduce the burden of fine debt on people experiencing economic and social disadvantage in the region

People leaving prison in the region face homelessness and barriers to getting temporary accommodation and connecting with legal and support services. Recent research (AHURI 2022) indicates that people leaving prison have been the fastest growing client category for homelessness services over the last decade. Allocating public housing to people exiting prison can reduce their interaction with police and the criminal justice system. We would like to ensure that people leaving prison in the region know where to get help with housing and people on bail can access temporary accommodation.
