Role of Aboriginal Field Officers

- Assisting with client work intake and assessment of clients, liaison b/w solicitor and client, assisting with communication, attending outreach clinics, attending court list days, spotting systemic legal issues
- Engaging Community making connections with community members, Elders, clients and service providers; attending local meetings; being the 'face' of LANSW
- Community capacity building building awareness of LANSW services
- Assisting with outreach events and CLE
- Making referrals for both legal and non-legal help



Benefits of the AFO Program

- AFOs create and build connections between Aboriginal communities and the LANSW service
- Ensures culturally appropriate service delivery
- Works collaboratively with solicitors to provide wraparound service – allows us to meet the legal and non-legal needs of clients
- Linking clients to other supports and services
- Fill the gaps link clients to services where there is no Legal Aid Office (face to face, phone, AVLs)

Benefits of the AFO Program

- Increases access to legal services for Aboriginal people and communities
- Provides culturally appropriate services to Aboriginal people and communities
- Develops local community partnerships and referral pathways
- Identifies systemic issues (both legal and non-legal)
- Contributes to Closing the Gap targets, outcomes and priority reforms
