Making a parenting plan				
⊘ Format				
	Headings	Use a separate heading for each topic.		
	Font	 Easy to read style of font, such as arial. Size 12 font minimum. Double spaced. Left aligned. 		
	Paragraphs	Each paragraph should:include only one topicbe numbered consecutively.		
	Page numbers	Number each page consecutively.		
	Main heading	Choose a clear and simple heading.		
	Parties	List the parties to the agreement and their role, for example, Jules Bauma, father.		
	Overview	Begin your parenting plan with an overview that includes important background information, such as your child's name and date of birth.		
	Start date	Include a start date if you want your parenting plan to begin on a different day to the date you sign it.		

	Topics	Group the terms of your agreement by topic, such as, schooling and medical issues. Order the topics by level of importance, covering the most important topics first.		
	Agreement	Your plan must be signed and dated by all parties to the agreement.		
⊗ Language				
	Plain English	 Use plain, simple words – avoid legal and foreign words and phrases. Use short words and sentences. Use bullet points to break up long sentences and create lists. 		
	Be specific	Include important details, such as: dates times locations names.		
	Create clear obligations	 Clearly identify the responsibilities of each party. Use words that create an obligation, such as, 'must'. Include one obligation per paragraph.

	Necessary terms	Your parenting plan must cover at least one of these issues: • who has parental responsibility for your child • who your child lives with • who your child spends time with • the communication between your child and the other parent and family members • financial support for your child • the process for resolving parenting disputes
